Question 1

Question 4

Read the following passage carefully and answer the questions that follow:

At the close of a summer day the narrator sat on a farmhouse porch atop a hill. A sixty-year-old servant, Aunt Rachel, sat respectfully on a lower step cheerfully enduring merciless chafing. As she roared with laughter, the narrator asked her, "How it is that you had never had any trouble?" Taken aback, she replied, "Mister C-, are you in earnest?" Sobered by her manner, the narrator said, "Since I have never seen you other than cheerful, I thought you never had a bad day in your life". Aunt Rachel became serious and began her story.

I was born as an African-American and therefore, me and my family had to suffer prejudices because of the colour of our skin. Despite the reality of being forced into servitude, I had a loving husband and had seven children, whom we dearly loved.

Remembering her mother, she said that my mother often used to say, "I was not born in the mesh to be fool by trash! I am one of the all Blue Hen's Chickens!" And I too used my mother's expression often when I got annoyed.

My mistress went broke and auctioned off all her servants in Richmond. One by one, I lost my husband and six children. Only my youngest child, Henry, remained, and I held him tightly. Henry whispered to me that he would run away and work so that he could buy me freedom. Despite my fierce resistance, Henry was eventually taken away. Since that day, twenty-two years ago, I had not set eyes on my husband or six of my children.

I was taken to "Newbern" where I became the family cook. During the American Civil War, when the Union took the town, the family fled, leaving all its servants behind. Union Army officers then occupied the house and I started cooking for them. These officers treated me respectfully and gave me unquestioned command over the kitchen.

Remembering Henry's vow to escape I one day asked the officers if they might have seen him. I described Henry as very little, with scars on his wrist and forehead, but a General reminded me that after thirteen years Henry would now be a man—something that I had completely forgotten.

My house was often the site of soldier balls, during which I guarded the kitchen zealously. One night, there was a ball for soldiers, who particularly irritated me. When a young man danced into my kitchen I chased him away from kitchen repeating the words my mother often used to say. My words made the man's expression change momentarily.

I overheard, the young man telling a companion that he would not return with the others that night. Early the next morning, as I was cooking in the kitchen, the same young man unexpectedly reappeared and looked at me closely in the eye. Suddenly I knew. I dropped my pan and examined his scarred wrist and forehead. It was my Henry. "Oh, no, Mister C-," Rachel said, "I had no trouble. And no joy!"
